

Mrs. Guloski Buried; No New Developments

Funeral services were held today at the Immaculate Conception Church for Mrs. Anne Guloski, Sinclair St., who was found strangled in Higgin's Quarry area near Bellevue, Friday morning. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

Bellevue police aided by auxiliary policemen cooperated with Sandusky Co. deputy sheriffs Saturday to comb the area around the quarry for possible clues. Included in the party were special investigators from the Ohio Bureau of Investigation, London, O.

An area about a mile wide was searched thoroughly before the officers returned to Bellevue where they traced the route Mrs. Guloski usually took when walking to her home at night from Isaly's Dairy Store, where she was employed as a dishwasher.

Police Chief Russell Hetrick said there were no new developments in the case this morning. The same report came from the sheriff's department, but both organizations were leaving no stone unturned in an effort to bring to justice the person, or persons responsible for the brutal death.

As in all cases of this kind, many rumors are circulated. One was that Mrs. Guloski's spectacles and buttons from her white uniform were found by searchers on Harkness St., Saturday, but this was not substantiated by Chief Hetrick.

Another rumor was that a suspect was being held in jail.

Sandusky Co. Prosecutor, Attorney Harry Sargeant today said that no inquest has been scheduled. He explained that inquests are almost a thing of the past in Ohio. He also added that the report he has had from the coroner Dr. Frank Visconti, is that death was caused by

strangulation.

A report from a local resident that he saw a woman, dressed in a waitress uniform walking on E. Main St., at about

11:10 p.m. Monday, Sept. 16, the last time the victim was seen alive, has been checked out by police. No positive identification has been established.

As close as can be determined, Mrs. Guloski left the dairy store, sometime between 11 p.m. and 11:20 p.m. last Monday.

Her daughter, Mrs. Donald Kegerreis, N. Sandusky St., said Tuesday her mother had not been in her home on Sinclair St. Monday night.

When she did not report for work that evening, police were notified by the family.

The body was discovered at approximately 10 a.m. Friday by David Hire, rural Bellevue, who told police he had been sleeping in his car at the quarry. The body was about 15 feet from his vehicle when it was discovered, surrounded by high weeds.

A witness at the scene later reported that there was some indication of a scuffle in the area where the body was found. He said the white uniform of the victim was pulled above her waist, and her underthings were nearby. One of her stockings was fastened tightly about her neck and there was 'something white' on her face.

It was believed the victim had been sexually molested but this has not been proved by the autopsy at Fremont Memorial Hospital Friday.
