# THEODORE THIERY, 72 DIES; RITES MONDAY

## Angina Pectoris Fatal To Tiffin Native

Theodore Thiery, 72, retired employe of the U. S. Glass Company, died at 6:15 p. m. Friday in his home at 266 South Sandusky street. He had suffered an attack of angina pectoris several days ago but his condition was not considered immediately critical and he died suddenly of a second attack.
