Retired Sheet Metal Worker Died Sunday

Karl Schreiner, 85, retired sheet metal worker who resided with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Harper, on State Route 53 south of Tiffin, died at 1:50 p. m., Sunday Nov. 18, 1951, in Mercy hospital. He had been in frail health for a year but was critically ill for only three days.

their propaganda statements that they really desire peace.

It calls for creation of a new 12-nation disarmament commission to replace the present UN commissions on conventional armaments and atomic energy. Like the old commissions, it would comprise the 11 members of the Security Council plus Canada.

The committee would work up plans for an arms and troops census, an inspection system, progressive disarmament and an ultimate ban on atomic weapons.

The conflict in the world is rising to an "alarming state," Acheson said. "Tension in the world has already reach a dangerous point. There is actual fighting in Malaya, Indo-China and
